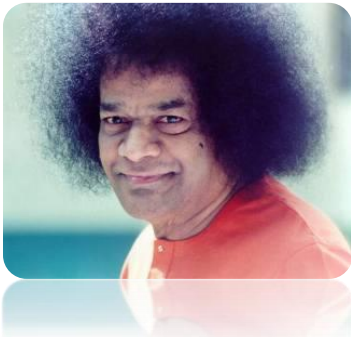

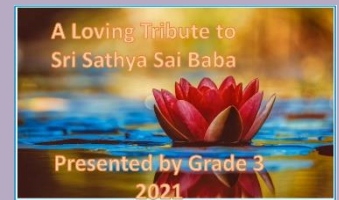

There is only one language, the language of the Heart;
There is only one caste, the caste of Humanity;

He spread the message of selfless love in his actions and projects, bringing the necessities of life to people and thereby uplifting society.

His vast water projects bring clean drinking water to millions of people.

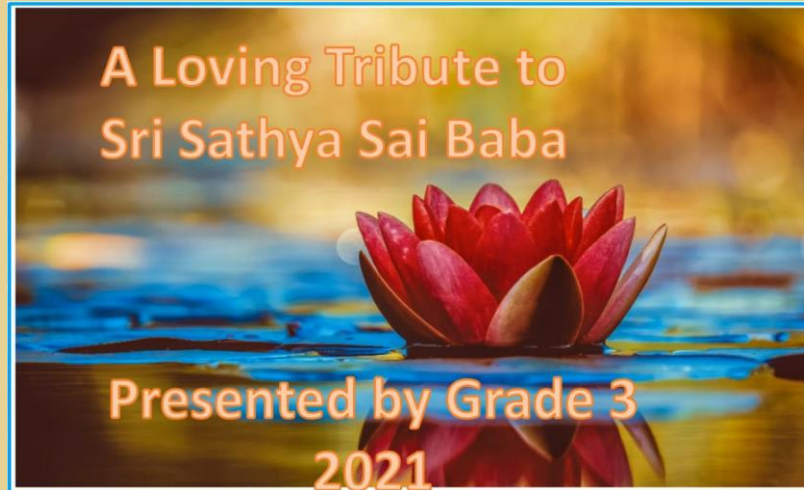
Sai Baba has inspired millions of followers around the world to embrace human values in order to transform themselves and society.

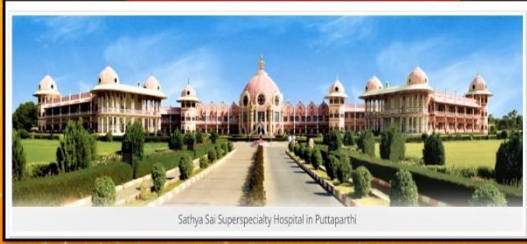





NON-VIOLENCE = is understanding that we all have obligations towards all other beings in the world and not harming anyone or anything in anyway. Our words, thoughts and actions should harmonize not only locally but also globally.

Activity: The students performed an action song titled "We Are the World" by Lionel Richie and Michael Jackson. Ever since this song was released it became a phenomenon, reaching different people from all walks of life all over the world, to unite and help one another, to promote social justice, to serve when calamity strikes, and to appreciate other cultures and beliefs.

PEACE = is felt when the mind is still. It is also experienced when your mind and body are aware or in control of the situation especially under stress.

Activity: The students took part in colouring mandalas. Studies have revealed that people who colour mandalas experience a sense of calmness and soothing feelings. The geometric construction of mandalas provides an artist with repetitive movements which focus their attention and bring out their creativity. It is a great exercise for kindergarteners who are working on their self-regulation and emotions. In addition, relaxing instrumental music was played as the students coloured their mandalas.

LOVE = is more than just an emotion. It is an action which is meant to grow and be shared. It is the undercurrent of all the values. Love towards God, humanity and life-long learning.

Activity: The students created a Love Necklace. This love necklace is an expression of their friendship, kindness, caring, appreciation, empathy and love towards their selves or to others. At the end of the

activity, the students opted to give their necklace to a special person or keep it as a reminder of self-love.

RIGHT CONDUCT = is seeing, doing and being good. It is necessary to make good choices in life, as they are important for character development. Our right conduct is always tested on a day-to-day basis, and is a reflection of our love in action.

Activity: Children took part in a game called Poor Choices Vs. Good Choices. The teacher demonstrated and read a series of scenarios/stories to the class in a PowerPoint presentation. The students had to determine whether the example was a good or poor choice by raising either the picture of a thumb-up or thumb-down. After every scenario, the teacher called upon a volunteer to explain his/her answer.

TRUTH = is permanent and timeless, in all times past, present, and future. All mankind should make it a goal to always have courage in pursuit of what is true.

Activity: Sweet Detectives! Each student brought two healthy treats and two unhealthy treats in the class (like fruits cut bite-size, cereals, chips, chocolates). We each took turns introducing and naming what we brought in. One at a time, each student picked and ate one of the samples they had, without the rest of the class seeing. Then they invited others to guess which treat was sampled.

'Did the sampler take the healthy or unhealthy treat?' Any deception the "sampler" used like leaving crumbs around the mouth or making the table messy or denying even if others guessed it correctly, is concealing the truth or lying. Honesty is being true to yourself, doing what is right even if no one is watching.

At the end we enjoyed our sweets!

Puppets Ernie and Bert enacted a scenario, followed by discussion of all the values. Some points they discussed:

- 1) Practicing to tell the truth, even if one did something wrong. It is good to always apologize for mistakes.
- 2) Practicing the value of love and sharing their candies, without feeling annoyed, and showing love by offering to help another person.
- 3) Practicing nonviolence and peace by not pushing, staying calm and acting peacefully.
- 4) Not practicing right conduct when poor choices are made, e.g. when yelling and pushing.

Value: Love – Necklace making

- 1) Students coloured necklace circles and finished the sentence, "I practice love by_____."
- 2) Students cut out all the necklace circles, attached a yarn to it and wore it.

Value: Right Conduct – "The Giving Tree"

The teacher read *The Giving Tree* book, stopping to ask questions such as:

- 1) How do you think the tree is feeling?
- 2) Did the tree make good choices? What about the boy?
- 3) What are some of the good choices we can make? What can we give?

Activity: The giving tree craft – students filled their trees with things they can give.

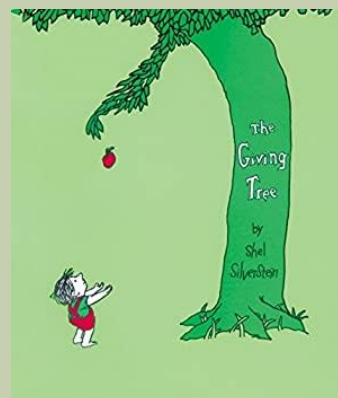

Nonviolence: Students created a board game on the value Nonviolence and the sub-values related to it.

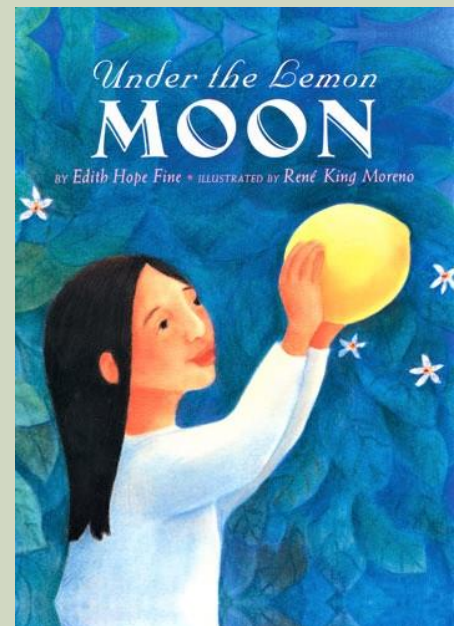
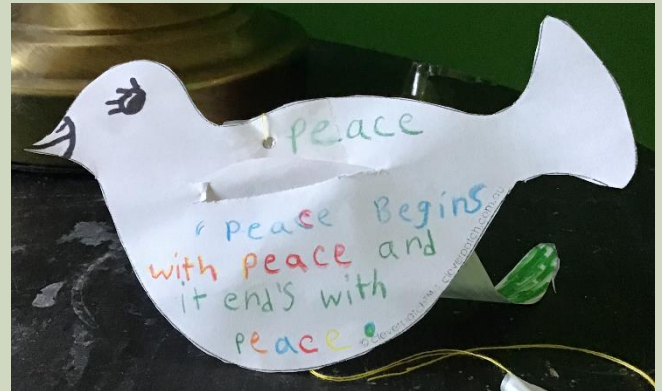
Peace: Students created a dove using the template and added rainbow colour to the wings. Inside the body of Dove, they wrote a message of Peace that they would love to spread in the world.

Children Helping Children Campaign 2021

Presented by Mrs. Sobana Sharanigan and grade 1 students

[Excerpts from video]

1st student: "Children Helping Children Campaign is a selfless service project in which children will do one month of extra chores and make sacrifices to raise money from family and friends who have agreed to sponsor their work. The money raised by all the students is donated to help children worldwide. The purpose of the CHC Campaign is to provide help to some of the many children around the world who are impoverished, have no education, no family support, have no food, or are victims of natural disasters. The goal is to transform children living in poverty into tomorrow's leaders."

2nd student: "Today I am going to speak about my true inspiration for Children Helping Children. For many of us it is as easy as turning on a tap to get clean water, but in some countries, finding clean water is nearly impossible. It is the story of Ryan Hreljac who helped the entire village to get clean water. He did this big task when he was just six years old like me, and he made his grade 1 project as Ryan's Well Foundation. Ryan's journey of helping other children started when he was in grade 1 and he raised money for his first well for Angulo Primary School in Uganda. He spoke around the world about water issues and water-borne diseases, and the importance of making a difference no matter who you are or how old you are. He visited our school on May 17, 2001. Ryan's hard work, strong determination and selfless effort have helped him to raise thousands of dollars to build many wells in poor countries. His foundation has brought clean drinking water to over 16 countries, which has not only saved millions of lives, but has inspired others to be kind and big-hearted like he is – especially to me as he always says everyone just needs to find their puzzle piece

which fits into the world and solves the world's problems. When I think of my puzzle piece, I feel like spreading love and providing books to other children so they can learn and get knowledge, these are the best things that we can give to our entire world, and awareness and spreading knowledge are the only things

that can solve the world's problems and make an impact on other children's lives.

Our CHC tradition started after Ryan visited our school in 2001. We should participate in CHC as much as possible, and together with other children we are responsible for bringing equality to the society and spreading love and knowledge to other children who need our help. Our Sri Sathya Sai Baba says about this, 'Engage yourself in service activities and consider social service as a service to God. This is the best way to earn God's love. Love All and Serve All.'



SS: "Our school is very special as it focuses on five human values and how they affect us and others who are around us. This CHC Campaign is a very special project, as it is a great example of how these values that we are learning in our school, can go beyond borders despite our age.

Our Founder Chancellor Sri Sathya Sai Baba says, "Being a good example is the best form of service." So, let us set a good example of what selfless service looks like to ourself and to the world. Our Founder Chancellor has set an example of what selfless service looks like through his actions. He said, "Love All, Serve All. Help Ever and Hurt Never." He helped many people around the world by providing them with free education, free health care and access to drinking water. Since 2001,



our school and former students have helped many people around the world, such as victims of war and earthquakes, and to children in impoverished schools.

Let us begin our act of selfless service. How do we implement that in our school, especially in these unprecedented times?"

3rd student: I am in grade 1. How do we implement CHC Campaign? When Ryan Hreljac visited our school in 2001, the three young classes at that time – JK, SK, Grade 1 – were tired by doing extra chores and contributed money to the CHC fund, which was then presented to Ryan during his visit, representing the Ryan's Well Foundation. Since that visit, the Sathya Sai School has funded the building of three wells in Africa. The CHC Campaign each year instills the spirit of sacrifice in the students, as they gladly give up buying toys, birthday gifts, and other nonessential items, and instead donate this money to the CHC fund. Students have discovered unusual sacrifices, including girls raising money by cutting their hair for wigs for cancer patients. Parents are asked not to just give their money to their children for CHC – the children have to earn it in some way.

Since then, each year, the students at Sathya Sai School have worked hard and sacrificed for children suffering around the world. Each year, 10% of the money raised by the students is donated to Ryan's Well Foundation, and the remaining 90% is donated to a chosen international project to help children.

Now what do we have to do to raise money? Please do chores at your house and record the date, time, and the amount of money you earned for that chore, and submit the recorded notes and money to your class teacher. Drops of water turn into a mighty ocean. Let us all give our helping hands for those who are in need. Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much. Thank you and have a wonderful day."

Mrs. Sharanigan: "Love and simple acts of kindness can lead to domino effects in our society. Let us make our mode one of love and kindness so that it spreads around the whole world. Practicing values is equal to living a full life in thoughts, words, and in actions.

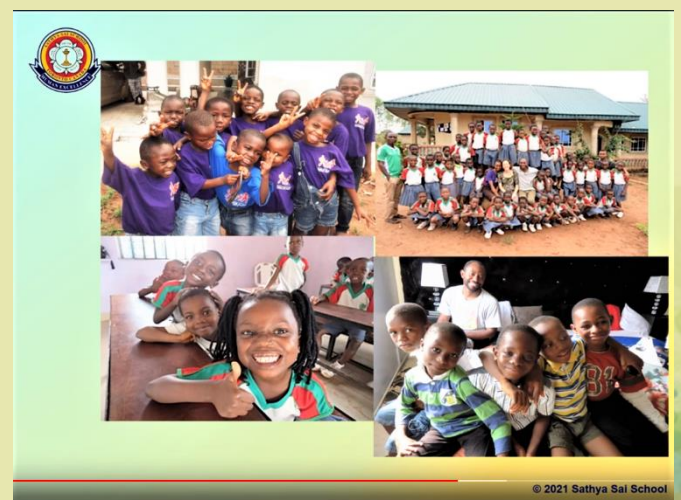
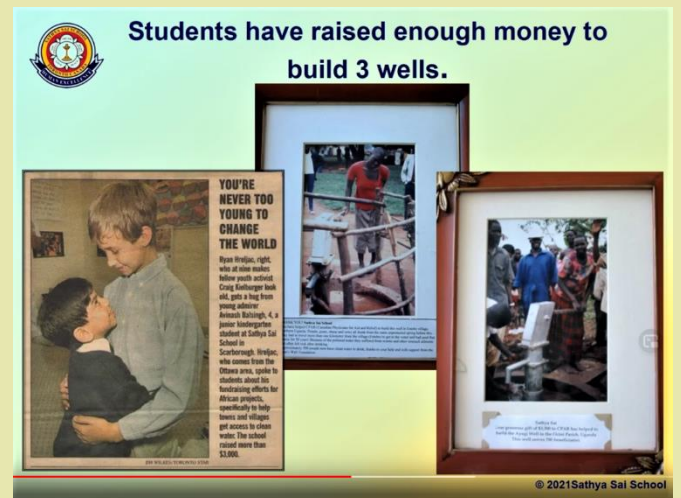

History of Earth Day

Earth Day provides us with a time "to appreciate, reflect upon, and to demonstrate action to protect this planet we call home" :

- To raise awareness of climate change and global warming.
- To act towards the protection of one's environment.
- The need for the conservation of the Earth.
- Celebrated on April 22nd because this is between the Spring Break and Final Exams of most colleges, allowing college students to participate in Earth Day activities. It also is close to Arbor Day, the day for planting trees to recognize the importance of trees in our environment.

Ways to celebrate Earth Day

- Exercise outside (e.g. walking, biking), to reduce use of cars and fuel emissions.
- Use things that are re-usable, such as water containers, shopping bags.

Earth Day at the school in pre-pandemic times

- The students were assigned to clean up different areas of the school's environment, by collecting litter in garbage bags. The activity was both cooperative and enjoyable. It reinforced students' awareness of the importance of respecting rather than damaging Mother Earth.



- In 2015, the entire school turned off its lights for the whole day to demonstrate an easy way to save energy, in support of nature and our planet.

- The new school building has solar panels installed, to help conserve energy.

Ways to Celebrate Earth Day from Home

- Turning off lights when not in use.
- Buying eco-friendly light bulbs.
- Limiting water use, e.g. in the shower or when washing dishes or brushing teeth.
- When going to a nearby destination, walk or bike instead of driving, to keep pollution down.
- Using public transportation and carpooling to reduce the number of cars on the road.
- If possible, use electric or solar powered cars.
- Try to buy organic or locally produced foods, instead of processed foods or foods transported from distant places.

Making a Seed Bomb

- Seed bombs are clusters of earth, clay or paper that contain plant seeds which can be scattered on the ground where needed. They help to bring about the growth of new plants in nature.
- New growths help animals and insects that pollinate the earth using these plants.

Role Play on methods to Reduce Waste

- You can recycle paper, rigid plastics, jars, cardboard, aluminum beverage cans. Be careful not to include food waste, chemical containers, light bulbs, foam cartons, batteries and wood.
- Recycling is reusing materials for different purposes, such as melting the plastic in a plastic water bottle and using this to make something completely different out of the same plastic.
- Recycling helps the environment by conserving natural resources, protects ecosystems and wildlife, reduces the demand for raw materials, saves energy and lowers carbon emissions.
- The collection and disposal of recycled materials creates new jobs. Your small act of recycling a plastic water bottle has a domino effect that helps so many people.
- Remember the 3Rs: Reuse, Reduce, Recycle.

Ways to Be More Mindful towards the Earth

- Avoid fast fashion brands that use materials that are harmful to the environment and use child labour.
- Each year, eight million tons of plastic waste escape into the ocean from coastal nations. We should do our best to reduce plastics by using reusable items.
- At home, turn of the lights when you are not using them; take showers instead of baths; adjusting your thermostat; washing your laundry by hand or in cold water; composting if you can.

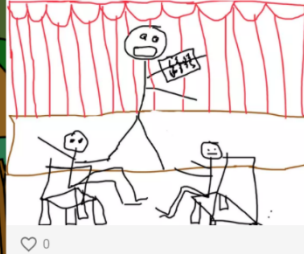


What value connection is with the Sikh flag?
